They serve as the Chief of Staff, reporting to the Board, and are bound by the Executive Limitations and Ends. David grew up in a devout Methodist congregation and later attended various other Protestant denominations before discovering the Unitarian Church of Harrisburg in 2007. This path of discovery gave him an appreciation of the breadth and inclusiveness of Unitarians.



David assumed the role of organizer in the Humanism Lay-Led Ministry shortly after its founding. He organized speakers at the church for three years, and later assisted in organizing and then leading the second-Sunday forum. Before serving on the Search Committee (2014-15), he was part of the transition team (2013) for interim minister Rev. Eric Posa.

Message from the Board

Message from the Board

Many of you by now will have heard of the UCH Healthy Congregations Task Force formed shortly after the May 17 vote on calling a new minister. Based on timing, it might seem that the Task Force was created to deal with our current difficulties. In truth, however, its beginnings derive from the latest

group of UChers to attend the Healthy Congregations workshop periodically offered by our denomination's district, the Joseph Priestley District. This dedicated trio of lay leaders – Laura Edinger, Nancy Hall, and Sandy Hamstra – attended four Saturday sessions this spring with other lay leaders in the district to learn about systems theory and how it works in congregations. Systems theory is an interdisciplinary way of examining how members of a system interact, with the intent of improving communication and learning how to develop healthy patterns of living in community. After the last session of the Healthy Congregation workshop, Laura, Nancy, and Sandy desired to deepen and strengthen their new understandings of congregational life by meeting regularly with other UCH graduates of the program.

The very day after they returned from their final session, we had our Congregational Meeting to call a new senior minister. The need for healing work for our congregation suddenly became obvious and urgent, and the Task Force was authorized by the Board of Trustees in late May, with a specific goal of doing the work necessary to restore our wounded community soul. At the same time, the Board retained an outside consultant, Mike Harris, as someone who

could review our church's situation dispassionately and give unbiased advice about how to address the issues that trouble us.

The Task Force is charged with collecting input from the congregation as core data for Mike. The Task Force comprises the trio named above as well as other graduates of Healthy Congregations: Chris Dutton, Kate Carpenter, and myself. Trustee Debbie Reihart, a skilled facilitator with professional leadership training, is also participating. As directed by Mike, the Task Force is conducting Small Group Meetings where participants can speak freely in a safe environment. Each meeting has a facilitator and a scribe; the facilitator's job is to ensure a safe environment for honest speech and the scribe's job is to capture the essence of the concerns, thoughts, and feelings expressed by each participant. The Task Force will compile the information and send it to Mike; it is a primary source of data for his eventual report to the Board.

So far, we have held four Small Group Meetings with 35 participants, with more planned over the coming months. The challenge is to schedule meetings at a variety of times and places to enable all stakeholders to provide input.

The Task Force hopes to have every UCH member/friend attend a meeting and share their thoughts, concerns, and feelings so that Mike Harris can swiftly develop a clear picture of priorities for the Board. If every member and friend makes attending a meeting a priority, the Task Force will soon have the information necessary for our community to move forward, spiritually, financially, and emotionally.

Assistant Minister's Message

July is my last month to actively serve the UCH as Assistant Minister and (for July) the only minister on staff. I will take the first week as vacation, and the week of July 19-25 as study leave, when I will be attending and leading a worship service at the Southeast Unitarian Universalist Summer Institute ([SUUSI](#)), the largest annual gathering of UUs outside of General

Assembly. I lead worship at Clover Lane for the last time on July 12, preaching on "Beloved Community," followed by a farewell party. I lead worship on "The Wisdom of Eve" at Market Street on July 19, leaving immediately after service for SUUSI. My final worship service for UCH will be July 26 at Market Street on "Beloved Community" and will be followed by a farewell final party. This service will be slightly different from the Clover Lane service as it will include my reflections on being the minister for the Market Street Church and the community programs there. I will continue working through the end of July with the RGL Steering Committee to get in place the best staffing, curriculum, registration, and calendaring possible for our children and youth for next year.

When the co-ministry candidates for Senior Minister did not

accept the call to come to UCH, your Board of Trustees honored my two year contract with UCH, and their first staffing choice was to have me as the only minister and to hire a Director of Religious Education. My decision to resign came from the realization that having a different minister at each of the two locations may have had the unintended effect of revealing the depth of the differences in the two locations. Much as Rev. Posa said in his last column in June, I truly believe that the steps the Board of Trustees has taken to deeply engage with these differences will lead to healthier relationships across the UCH community.

My official start date as the Interim Minister at the [Northwoods UU Church](#) is September 1. I will use my remaining vacation and study time from UCH in August to prepare for and complete my move to The Woodlands, TX, just north of my hometown, Houston. It will be a very different ministry than I've had at UCH, and yet, I'm sure I will learn to love those congregants as I have come to love you. You will always hold a very special place in my heart, as my first ministry, and as my ordaining congregation. I thank you all deeply. Be well and well blessed, my beloveds.

Clover Lane Summer Services


Rev. Posa Farewell

UUPlan Activities

A busy month for the **Economic Justice Team**: Payday lending surfaced again when a co-sponsorship memo was announced by Senator Yudichak. UUPLAN joined with other faith leaders, AARP, and Veterans organizations to urge Pennsylvania Senators to refrain from co-sponsoring predatory products trying to gain a foothold in Pennsylvania.



Raise the Wage PA launched "10 days for \$10.10." Rev. Anne Mason of the UU Church of Lancaster represented UUPLAN in an interview with Sen. Art Haywood (District 14) about the need to increase the minimum wage in Pennsylvania. UUPLAN members joined Pennsylvanians United to Amend for a lobby day in Harrisburg. The Resolution for a Convention of the States for free and fair elections now has bi-partisan, bicameral sponsorship. Watch for the resolution to be introduced soon.

The **Reproductive Justice Team** has mounted an effort to thwart ultra-conservative legislators in Harrisburg from defunding family planning dollars from Planned Parenthood in Pennsylvania. Please consider signing this [sample letter](#) and sending it to your legislators, regardless of your/their party.

The **Immigration Justice Team** continues to monitor the situation at the Berks County Detention Center with the goal of closing the facility to asylum seekers and ending family detentions.

A long-awaited announcement for the LGBTQ community is anticipated any day regarding non-discrimination in Pennsylvania, in light of the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision. When we get the word, we'll need all hands on deck to move this legislation forward. Sign up to help us reach out to state legislators by phone-banking.


