Minister's Message



On Friday afternoon, September 14, 2012 at a prayer vigil for the latest gun killing in Harrisburg, I stood on the steps of our Market Street church and told those who had gathered that we, the Unitarian Church of Harrisburg, were not going anywhere. I said we had come to the City of Harrisburg to bring more peace, hope, love, and justice to the corner of 16th and

Market Streets. I said we had made a promise and that we meant to keep it. And at the same time, a little voice in the back of my head said, "You are crazy, you know! Who are you to promise anything to these people? Who are you to commit your congregation to work that is so difficult?" And that little voice is right, too. Who are any of us to promise that we will try to make things better? Who are we to get people's hopes up? Each of us knows that, despite our effort, some things work out well and some things work out poorly. Some projects succeed and some fail. Some choices turn out to be good ones and other turn out to be foolish ones.

As I stood there in the beautiful autumn afternoon light looking out at that small crowd, the little voice of doubt left me as quickly as it had come. I realized that I honestly did not know how things would turn out—for me, for us, for the neighborhood. But what gave me hope was that I saw the full range of humanity before me. I saw UCH members, young and old. I saw Latino and African American residents of Allison Hill. I saw a Baptist minister and a rabbi and a leader in the Nation of Islam. I saw people from the Catholic Worker House. I saw the mayor of Harrisburg and the chief of police, too. I saw Sparkie and Trish and Tom and Meg and Cordell and Blaise and so many more—members of our congregation who had simply showed up because of a promise we made as a congregation four years ago. When I looked over that small crowd, I realized that it didn't really

matter what UCH had said it would do when we took up residence in the City of Harrisburg. It mattered what we did, long after those promises had been made. Only our actions could make a difference.

Promises are important. And the commitment that follows the promises is even more important. Where we go. What we do. How we are. What we say. These are the important things. And we will get it wrong from time to time. We are human. We will break our covenants and have to repair them. But what we do is still the most important thing. Love, Howard

President's Message



The church year is in full swing, with quite an extensive range of activities for us. The sheer scope of lay-led ministries, Religious Growth and Learning (RGL) classes, and Coffee House Concerts, was one of the main reasons for Larry and me to join this church. We came from a very small UU congregation in upstate New York.

UCH seemed to do many of the same things, but also much more. As you browse through the Annual Edition of the REPORTER that was mailed out a few weeks ago, you can see the many things to choose from. As the year goes on, other events will most likely be added to the calendar. We are so fortunate to have a growing, vibrant church.

On September 22, I was invited to give the welcome at the monthly Community Connections Re-Entry Breakfast sponsored by the Prison Action Committee of Christian Churches United. It was held at our Market Street campus and co-sponsored by UCH's Helping Women in Prison and Their Families. This was the first re-entry breakfast that I've attended, and I enjoyed the opportunity to meet those in the program and learn about their plans to exit halfway houses and probation. Some of them even spoke to the group about their struggle to change their lives by leaving addiction or other illegal activities behind. This was not just about having breakfast, but about gaining strength from others to face their difficult struggles. It seems that sometimes a meal is more than a meal. Volunteers from our church and Messiah College made it happen. Margaret Carrow was the chef in charge of a plentiful meal, Jim Cavanaugh organized the program, and Brad Bechtel provided the music. Chris Dutton, John Hargreaves, Phil Hoskins-Helm, Tom Conners, Ann Lebo, Kathleen Daugherty, Marilyn McHenry, Nancy Hall, Cathy Montes, Wendy Colby, Larry Linder, and many others supported this event for

members of our community who are struggling to find jobs, education, and a life free of addiction. Here is an opportunity for us to live our faith.

Another "old" program at UCH is seeking a new life. When Larry and I joined UCH, we also joined a COUCH group.

"COUCH" is an acronym for "Connecting Our Unitarian Church of Harrisburg" and UCH's small group ministry. The group that we joined, and currently belong to, has been together for many years. We were new to the area, and they were a wonderful resource. They helped us find our way around. We still meet twice a month, and enjoy the friendship of this caring group.

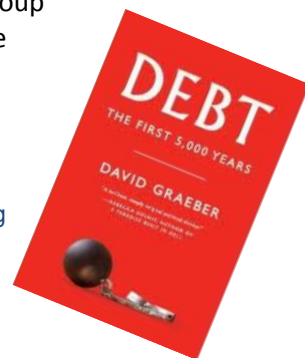
