#### Naming the Past and Planning for the Future

Dear friends,

The Worship Theme this month is “Naming the Past and Planning for the Future.” Some groups have been busy behind the scenes, gathering data, creating presentations, and planning for upcoming “town hall” meetings, so that this material can be presented

to the congregation and create opportunities for feedback. Although it may look like we haven’t done anything about planning for the church’s future, since our last meeting with the district consultant, the truth is we have been busy bees, behind the scenes. I want to particularly lift up the work of the Board, the Multi-Site Ministry Task Force appointed by the Board and led by Chris Dutton (this group includes some members of the congregation, too), and the Healthy Congregation Task Force. Elsewhere in this issue, you can read more particulars about the work of the Board and the HCTF, but I’d like to say that I have been impressed and encouraged by their efforts on your behalf.

While I intend to remain neutral about the outcome of our process, I’d like to say a bit about how I imagine our process will unfold. Upon the recommendation of our consultant, we decided to research several scenarios of successful “multi-site ministries.” The intention, for the end of the process, is for the congregation to determine the structure and methods necessary for operating our particular church in a sustainable and mission-achieving way.

By way of “naming our past,” the first scenario we will consider at our town halls will be the “status quo” scenario. Many thanks to Bart Carpenter, who has done most of the work on this one, including historical data about our finances, attendance, program offerings, and so on. We will then learn about other scenarios, based on what has worked successfully in other churches with more than one location. There are numerous possibilities, but a few come to mind for me are: Unified - one church, one set of staff, shared programs; Semi-Unified - one church, two sets of staff, shared programs; Yoked - two churches, one set of staff, separate programs; Independent - two churches, two sets of staff, separate programs, perhaps with inter-congregational cooperation on various projects; and various other possibilities...

Several trustees and congregation members at large are working hard to gather data and make projections (financial, programmatic, and other) about how each scenario would work in UCH’s particular situation. The scenarios they present may end up looking different than what I described above — the examples I use are what occur to me, but the work of many minds and many hands in the Task Force may come up with other possibilities.

With this information laid out (and we hope to have it distributed prior to meetings, as well, for those who wish to have more time to consider it), we would then like to have a dialogue about all of the scenarios. This is the “planning for our future” part. We anticipate this being a deliberate and considerate process, taking place over the course of the spring. Our goal is that we will begin to realize a congregational consensus — and, if so, that we can vote on a scenario at the Annual Meeting.

For now, I encourage patience. There is a lot of work happening behind the scenes to gather the information the congregation will need to make some important decisions about your collective future. All of that information will be coming to you soon.

May it ever be so and blessed be you all! — Rev. Mike

**Feb 7** *What do we believe in, and what do we do about it?* Rev. Walker

It has never been a free-for-all — so, what is UUism, then?

**Feb 14** *Finding Self in Relationships* Rev. Walker  
On Valentine’s Day, Rev. Mike explores love, friendship and other personal relationships and our needs for fulfillment in them. At the same time, contrary to some popular sentiment, it is not healthy to completely subsume the Self in relationships. Relationships are healthier when we still maintain our individual Selfhood. In a relationship between two people, there are actually three entities: you, me, and us. Us, as a unit, is very important; but our relationships should not be limited to just us, because the parts called you and me are each important, too.

**Feb 21** *A Service of Remembrance* Sparkie Radcliffe  
Each year, we take time to recollect the lives of those we have lost in the last year. Acknowledging death as a part of life, we still feel a loss for those who have gone, and this is a time to remember each of those people who have so touched our lives.

**Feb 28** *A Covenant of Care: What Does it Mean to be in a Covenantal Community* Rev. Walker  
In this sermon, Rev. Mike explores covenant, a formal and serious agreement that UUs make to life and society. This is not about a congregation’s Covenant of Right Relations, but rather the overarching concept of covenant, in which our Seven UU Principles are guidelines for the work we do for social justice, community building and fellowship. UUism is a covenantal faith, and we are a covenantal community, and this is a deeply important part of who we are and how we interact with the world.

Message from our President

Still waters run deep. By this I mean that you can't always determine what's going on by visible activity. Such a saying is especially appropriate in church, where the entire congregation is very rarely in one place at one time; things happen when you're not looking.

So it is with our current multi-site congregation project. This month, the

Board will present a short program after each Sunday service to explain the multisite project, explain what our options are for our two sites, and ask congregants to think and talk about their desires for our congregation. If you attend and contribute your ideas and thoughts, we will incorporate those thoughts and ideas into the preliminary proposals we will publicize in March and April. When everyone has had their say, we will have the final options ready for a congregational vote. Only through your participation can we shape our future; we on the Board are not very good at guessing what our congregation really thinks. We know, because we've tried, and it hasn't worked out particularly well.

Other progress we've made over the past couple of months includes new proposed bylaws on making big decisions, getting our financial house in order, and preparing for work on what our consultant Mike Harris called "how we are with one another." None of these issues are particularly sexy, as the saying goes, but each is extremely important to our continued existence and to our continuing work as people of faith in the Harrisburg area. People don't want to come to church in order to fight and be anxious; they come to church for renewal, for support, for companions on their journey to make the world a better place. The quiet work that the Healthy Congregations group is doing is to ensure that our church is a place for succor and positive energy, and a place where we can be at the same time honest and caring with one another.

It is the nature of most people to want some certainty about the future, even if "the future" is just tomorrow. Uncertainty can increase anxiety and prompt us to ask a familiar question, "Are we there yet?" The very essence of our Unitarian Universalist faith is that we are on a journey, that revelation is not sealed, and that arriving at solutions that make sense to us is not easy. We are not a uniform group, by any means. Some of us are parents of young children, others are retired. Some of us work in offices, some at home, and some in restaurants. Some of us are looking for paid work. Some provide care for others while also managing our own complex lives. A significant percentage of us are well off financially, and a significant percentage of us are struggling to make ends meet. We bring all these perspectives to the decision-making process of what we are as a church, and what we could be.

Each perspective is exceedingly valuable. Each and every one of us is important to our congregation, no matter how we participate in the daily life of the church. We must listen to one another carefully in this process of shaping our future, so that we can make the best and brightest future that is possible. And we are up to the task.

## ***LaGrone Scholarship Panel***

Each year the Oliver LaGrone Scholarship Committee is tasked with selecting participants to serve on the Oliver LaGrone Scholarship Committee (OLSC) Selection Panel. The panel is responsible for selecting a LaGrone scholar from the submitted applications from Harrisburg High School District seniors. The committee comprises:

- Two members of the Harrisburg community
- One representative of the UCH Senior High Youth
- Two UCH members at large

After the Selection Panel has established their criteria and reviewed applications, they may decide to conduct personal interviews with all applicants or just the finalists. The Selection Panel determines the interview schedule and content each year. At least two members of the regular OLSC are present to monitor and support the work of the Selection Panel at each of their meetings.

The Selection Panel meets three consecutive Wednesdays at Clover Lane:

- March 30 from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m.: Orientation
- April 6 from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m.: Panel decides selection criteria
- April 13 from 6:00 - 9:00 p.m.: Panel interviews and selects a scholar

Members of the panel must be available to attend all three nights. A light dinner will be served.

## Clean Slate Justice

In collaboration with the Dauphin County Bar Association, CareerLink@Capitol Region and Philadelphia Lawyers for Social Equity, UUPlan sponsored an expungement clinic in October 2015. Within a month of announcing the clinic, 250 people in Harrisburg had registered by phone seeking help. On the day of the clinic, a total of 86 intake interviews were completed. But we still have many people who need help.



UUPLAN, the UU Legislative Advocacy Network in PA has received a Matching Challenge Grant of \$10,000 from the UU Funding Program to sponsor additional expungement clinics. In order to raise the funds, the UU Funding Program has requested that we post a project on the UUA crowd-sourcing website [Faithify](#). Our project is “Clean Slate Justice” with the goal of sponsoring expungement clinics in PA for returning citizens who meet the criteria.

This project is a direct response to two UUA reads: *The New Jim Crow* by Michelle Alexander and more recently *Just Mercy* by Bryan Stevenson. In addition, at the 2015 GA, an Action of Immediate Witness to support the Black Lives Matter movement was adopted which includes the following statement: “No matter who you are, black lives matter, and a system of fair, transformative, and restorative justice that is accountable to communities is something to which each of us has a right.”

The launch date for Clean Slate Justice is February 1, 2016. The Faithify contributions will go directly to funding the anti-mass incarceration project, but remember - the matching money we raise can be used for the work of our other justice teams.



## Advocacy Training

The UUPLAN Environmental Justice Team has developed a plan for 2016 which includes an appeal to PA legislators for a *MORALtorium* on any new permits for wells that involve hydraulic fracking. We are collaborating with a number of faith groups in this effort and we are planning a Lobby Day in late March. Please consider joining us.


